




Baseline Trend = -1.2%/year Much Better Current Rate (vs. Expected) = +3.0% Worse


Health Outcome Trends










Public Health Significance for CHANGE



Growing Obesity — 12% – 1990; 30% - 2013 = Loss of life 10+ years Impact

Chronic Disease Burden — *Consumes 80% of healthcare expense*



Eliminating Risk Factors for Chronic Disease — 80% of heart disease, stroke, type 2 diabetes; 40% of cancer = GONE!




Investments in Prevention = Save \$! — *Prevention investment of \$1 = \$5.60 return*



Investments in Prevention = Save Lives! — 10% increase in public health funding reduces mortality rates by 1.1 to 6.9%





Braided Funding

- Braided Funding the <u>weaving</u> together of funding streams; and the development of funding strategies to support integrated pathways for improvement
- **Streams** grants, contracts, multiyear sources of federal, state, local funding, philanthropy, service fees, outside business
- Strategies Ways to create more funding opportunities independent of streams including: Reducing costs; Raising new revenue; or Redirecting existing revenue
- <u>Streams and Strategies are equally</u> <u>important = Focus on both</u>!






Public Health 3.0 Enhanced Scope of Public Health Practice


Leading Coordination and Communication Among Diverse Agencies and Sectors

- <u>Overarching leadership that intentionally connects</u> <u>purpose and work to different organizations</u> – thinking and operating beyond their immediate authority providing guidance, direction and momentum across organizational lines = shared course of action
- <u>Good for emergency management and issues that</u> <u>cross sectors</u>
- Intentional link and leverage of whole community efforts to galvanize valuable connectivity that achieves unity of purpose and effort
- Qualities of a Meta-Leader courage, curiosity, imagination, organizational sensibilities, persuasion, conflict management, crisis management, emotional intelligence (self-aware, self-regulate, motivation, empathy, social skill), persistence, meta-leadership as a valued effort





Dimensions of Meta-Leadership



PERSON high self-awareness, self knowledge, selfregulation – <u>build capacity to confront fear and lead</u> <u>themselves out of the "emotional basement"</u>

SITUATION maps the situation to what is happening and who are the stakeholders, what is likely to happen <u>next</u>

CONNECTIVITY <u>charts a course forward</u>, making decision, operationalizing those decisions and communicating effectively to recruit wide engagement and support

DOWN formal chain of command to subordinates creating a cohesive team

UP to whom the leader is responsible building confidence with formal supervisors, political officials, community leaders and oversight agencies

ACROSS peers and other units within the organization encouraging coordination and collaboration

BEYOND outside entities including the general public and media working to create a unity of purpose and effort



Public Health Leading Community Health Protocols Transition to Chief Health Strategist

Community Chief Health Strategist (NACCHO)

- Address the growing gap between the expansion of healthcare services and the achievement of health among individuals and communities
- Underscore the need for new and sustained leadership at the community level
- Bring community stakeholders together to prioritize the needs of the community
- Share their experience in providing essential services and leadership, engage communities to identify and support policy solutions, and collect, analyze, and share data
- Leverage resources to build integrated systems to achieve health equity



Chief Health Strategist – Like an Orchestra Conductor




• Enables practitioners to work across silos and distribute responsibly across vested stakeholders

Reach for Health Equity!



- Assist populations at risk with resources to drive change
- Some groups may need more than others = OK!
- Communities need <u>acceptable</u> and <u>authentically</u> safe opportunities for *all* of its members.



Systematic Reflection — Why, how, what is needed for change

Systems Thinking — Proper evaluation of all parties who may have an interest in a problem and what value they bring and gain from involvement

Strengths-Based Leadership — What assets and strengths can be brought to a team to address problems

Strategic Planning Readiness — An evaluation of sector's readiness for planning and moving forward to address an issue of the public's health

Authentic and Resonant Leadership — Leadership focused on values, renewal and connection to others through mindfulness, hope and compassion




