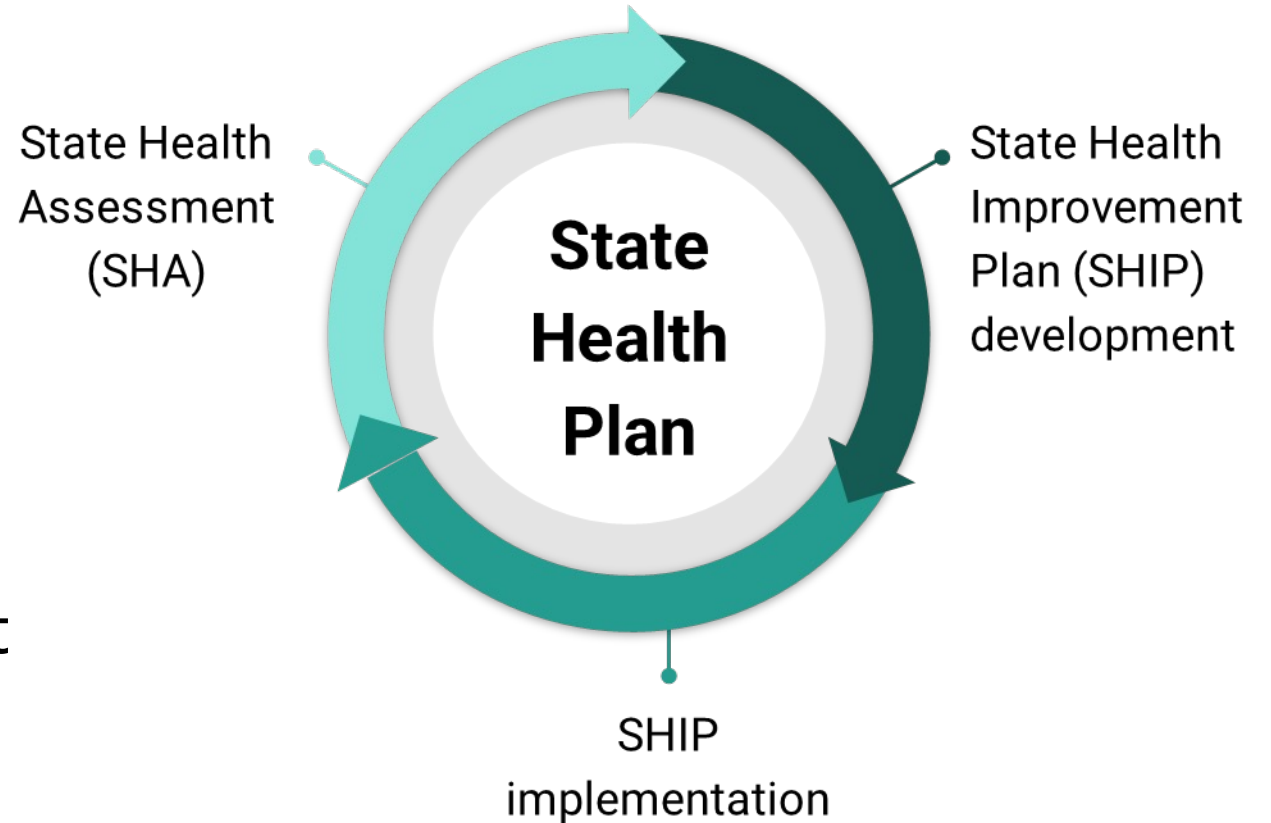

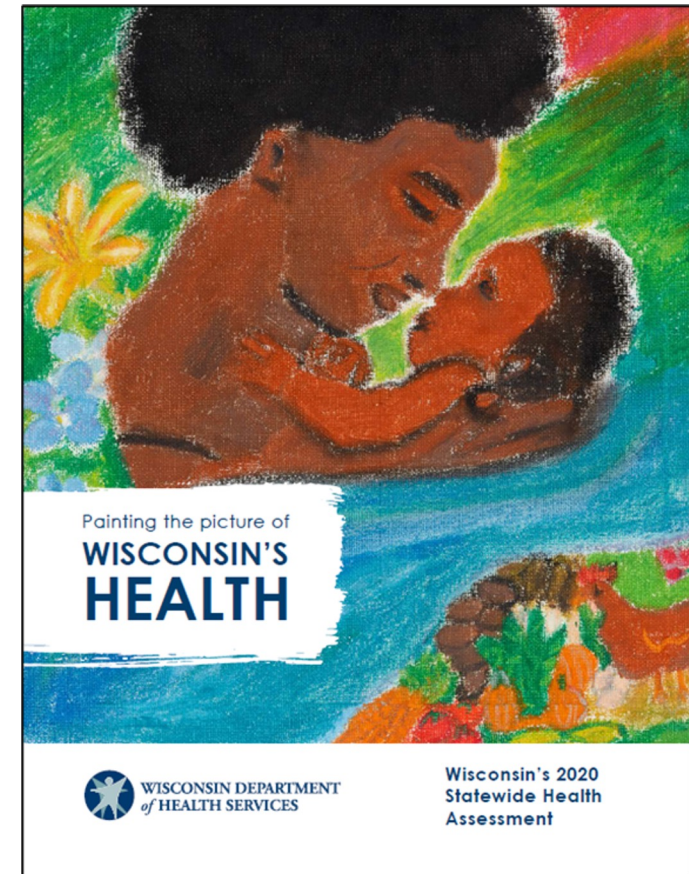
Wisconsin State Health Plan

2020 State Health Assessment Outcomes

- Qualitative Themes
 - Increasing social and community connections
 - Access to reliable transportation
 - Access to affordable housing
 - Access to jobs and other opportunities
 - Decreasing institutional biases
 - Access to quality and culturally informed healthcare
 - Access to community-based resources
- Increased focus on upstream factors

Focus on Partner Engagement

- Outreach to over 200+ partners across geographic, population, issue areas
- Collaborative prioritization process with community partners in series of conversations (service and advocacy)
- Strategizing with local and Tribal health departments in community of practice sessions, 1:1 conversations
- Implementation outreach to other state agencies
- Engagement with councils, academic, health care and membership organizations
- Input from all DPH bureaus and offices, collaboration with DPH strategic plan, and outreach across other DHS divisions
